There are no new sites since the last annual report at which 50% or more of the credits for degrees or certificates can be completed. Students can complete degrees and certificates at the main SCC campus; some degrees (but no certificates) can be completed at the Davis Center or West Sacramento Center of the college. These sites have been operating for many years. Substantive change reports were filed for each center in the past (e.g. for West Sac in 2002).

It is not clear to us whether the question asks us list all current programs for which 50% of the credits may be earned at each site or whether we are to list only new programs which fit this description. In order to offer as much information as possible, we have provided a list that includes ongoing programs for which 50% of the credits can be completed at the Centers. There are no new sites since the last annual report at which 50% or more of



the credits for degrees or certificates can be completed. The programs listed below are covered under previous substantive change reports.

Students can complete the GE of the AA/AS degree at the Davis Center and the West Sacramento Center of Sacramento City College as well as at the Main Campus. However, many classes requiring specialized facilities or equipment (e.g. many lab or studio classes and most vocational-technical classes) are not available at the Centers. Thus students at the Centers cannot complete the courses that are part of the required programs for all majors (no certificates can be completed 50% or more at the centers).

Sixty units are required to complete an AA/AS degree – this includes GE + required program in the major + additional units if needed. The degrees for which students cannot complete 50% or more of the units at the Centers are those for which required program for the major includes 30 or more units that cannot be taken at the Centers.

What follows is a list of ongoing programs for which 50% of the credits can be completed at the Centers because the GE component of the degree can be completed there. These are NOT new since the last Annual Report and the programs listed are covered under previous substantive change reports.

A: Partnership with Bell Helicopter Training Academy: The SCC Aeronautics Program formed a partnership with Bell Helicopter which resulted in changes to the SCC curriculum. This is not a new educational program, but an enhancement of an existing program. A Substantive Change Report was filed and accepted in Spring 2008 which detailed this program. Development of the program described below was in progress at the time of the last annual report and reference to the development was included in that report.



The Sacramento City College Aeronautics Department (SCC) and Bell Helicopter Training Academy (BHTA), Forth Worth Texas are both Federal Aviation Administration approved and certified aeronautics training organizations. The SCC Aeronautics program offers five Associate in Science degrees and six Career Certificates. The relationship with Bell Helicopter Training Academy expands and enhances the SCC Aeronautics programs and course offerings. All courses offered for credit remain under the sole and direct control of the SCC, which exercises ultimate and continuing responsibility to assure that conduct of the courses meets the standards of its regular programs. SCC requested approval for a relationship with BHTA whereby:

- SCC receives endorsement of 31 existing SCC Aeronautics courses from the Bell Helicopter Training Academy. This provides these students with the opportunity to continue more advanced continuing education at the Bell Helicopter Training Academy in Fort Worth Texas.
- Bell Helicopter Training Academy curriculum and materials for 3 new courses incorporated into the SCC Aeronautics course offerings. The curriculum for these three courses has been submitted to and reviewed by the SCC Curriculum Committee.
- Sacramento City College will provide college credit for 16 courses to be taught at BHTA. Students who enroll in these BHTA courses would have the option of receiving college credit by enrolling and registering online at Sacramento City College. These courses have been submitted to and reviewed by the SCC Curriculum Committee.

Student learning and achievement is assessed through student learning outcomes, testing, and achievement of F.A.A. examination standards.

SCC will prepare a pamphlet specifically for BHTA students which will provide Student Support Services contact information. Students will have online and telephone access to counselors. Information about the courses and programs

and schedules for courses will be published in the SCC catalogue, on the SCC website, and the SCC Aeronautics Department website. Students will also be recruited through publications and adjunct faculty at the BHTA site. Recruitment and counseling will follow the established SCC procedures. A student at the BHTA facility is not able to take more than one course at a time because the scheduling will be sequential. Therefore all BHTA students are part-time students and do not qualify for financial aid.

- 41) Describe the level of control the institution exercises over the contract. LRCCD General Counsel will oversee the development of the contract/ agreement form between SCC and Bell Helicopter Training Academy and will ensure that all provisions and guidelines are met, as outlined in the WASC Policy.

SCC adjunct instructors at the Forth Worth facility will be recruited using existing Los Rios Community College District HR processes and procedures for recruitment and selection of adjunct faculty. SCC adjunct instructors at the BHTA facility, when teaching SCC for-credit courses will be reporting directly to and be under the supervision of Sacramento City College. This is according to the existing SCC policies for ongoing evaluation and monitoring of instructor performance. SCC adjunct faculty teaching at BHTA facility will be evaluated and reviewed by SCC Advanced Technology Dean, SCC Aeronautics Department Chair and full time faculty using the established LRCCD Human Resources policies and procedures. This process includes student evaluations of faculty performance.

The SCC Advanced Technology Dean and SCC Aeronautics Department Chair will visit BHTA facility once per semester to facilitate adjunct faculty meetings. SCC Aeronautics faculty will conduct on-site audits and inspections of technical equipment, classrooms and labs. Additionally, the Advanced Technology Dean and Aeronautics Department Chair will conduct online and teleconference meetings to ensure adequate communication.
